

#### **GENERAL BUSINESS:**

#### **Bus Charges**

We continue to incur a deficit on the Transport Account, in Covid year higher than usual, but deficits continue. Analysis by Mike Champion shows reduced funds available for the next vehicle purchase expected sometime after 2035.

The committee has decided to increase the bus kilometre rates by 30c per km. The effect on fares will be:

Minimum member day fare goes from \$10 to \$15. Day trips travelling more than 185km increase by \$5 Sample weekend fare increases:

Ruapehu \$15

Kurapapango (Southern Kawekas) \$21

Tangihua \$19

Safari and interim parties (travel to/from Christchurch) \$19

These charges are effective for all fares from 1st September 2021

#### **Club Officers**

## Reports

## **President's Report**

If we thought last year was one of a kind .... well, this year was another of those. More lockdowns confined us to the Auckland area from mid August through to the start of December with no club trips, and then, when we were able to move and associate again, Omicron especially, also potential South Island isolation requirements, discouraged some members from joining our trips.

But we are not a club to stand still and hope for a return to "normal". Major activities this year that show clearly in our financial results are a significant subsidy for outdoor first aid training for our members, a new larger deck for NTK, and the transfer of all our old Wanderlusts and annual reports into a digital format, for immediate use in our run up to our 100th anniversary in 2025, and for the longer term preservation and accessibility of our club's history.

It has been another stunning year for the club, with a wide variety of day and multi day activities happening, and every edition of Wanderlust providing a real visual and content feast for our readers. Membership numbers have increased overall, although with a significant number of departures and new joiners being the current pattern.

Some of the most notable casualties of the Covid pandemic were the last minute cancellation of the planned bus expedition to the South Island in February / March for the Interim and Safari trips, with the regular November week trip away not having a chance at all. Some of our weekend trips have been postponed a few times now – hopefully we will get to the Southern Pureora forest this coming December – our fourth attempt! And our only end of year function was a relatively small picnic in the Domain. Club nights have not yet resumed following the lockdown, but the expectation is that these will be back to normal from May.

During the year we made submissions on the new Incorporated Societies Act (new ATC Constitution requirement coming up in due course), changes to the Freedom Camping regulations (potential for us to get lumped in with the definition of "freedom campers"), and on the Auckland Regional Parks Management Plan (a mammoth document that is very hard to be complimentary about).

I remain on the FMC Executive, with specific responsibilities as convenor of the Northern Area, now also the Membership Committee. It remains important that the challenges faced for northern outdoor recreation are recognised and considered at a national level.

Please read all the activity reports that present the Auckland Tramping Club as a vibrant bunch of outdoor enthusiasts, with a lot to offer our members, and the wider outdoor community. It is a real credit to all our event organisers, leaders, drivers, and the trip participants as to where we go and what we do.

During the year we ran well attended and well received training courses for Outdoor First Aid, Basic Snow Skills, and a second Basic Map Reading and Navigation course.

Linda Webber has now handed over the organisation of the Wednesday trips to Anna and Ian Roberts. Linda has taken the Wednesday trips programme from its traditional base of Waitakere plus some other locations, to principally other locations – a trying time, requiring a lot of work to research a wide range of alternatives. Thankyou Linda!

I have really appreciated the carefully considered and unstinting efforts of your committee members throughout the year. Thankyou to Andrew Murdoch and Chris Pooley who are now leaving the committee, and a warm welcome to Wendy Graham and Bruce Butler who will join us.

A very special thankyou to all our trip leaders and drivers who are always so keen to ensure that our trips run successfully, so that as many people as possible can enjoy our wonderful outdoor places.

## **Weekend & Extended Trips Report**

Another year, another couple of Covid variants having their way with the trips schedule. Prior to the Delta importation and subsequent restrictions the following weekend trips ran successfully:

April: Tararuas, Holdsworth & central Main Range area

May: Mt PiroingiaJune: Cape Brett

• July: Whangarei Heads

August: Tangihua Range

Scheduled weekend trips September through December to the southern Pureora Forest Park, southern Ruahine Forest Park and Hauhungatahi Remote Experience Zone were postponed due to Auckland's Delta variant outbreak and closed border. These trips will be back on the trip card over the coming year.

Once Auckland's border came down, and in spite of the appearance and spread of the Omicron variant, the following trips ran:

January: southeast Tararuas

February: Rotoroa IslandMarch: central Kaimais

Average number of participants on weekend trips was 21, down from 24 last year

The following extended trips also ran:

- June: the Old Ghost Road and Paparoa Track
- December/January: various trips in the Rees/Dart/Earnslaw massif areas, the Remarkables and the South Coast Track
- February: An Interim Fit from Makarora to Lake Ohau, and an Interim Medium in the northern Kaimanawas (as a stand-in for the postponed Matukituki Valleys in Aspiring N.P.)

Average number of participants on extended trips was 7, down from 12 last year

Thanks to all those who put their hand up to lead trips throughout the year. Without leaders we have no trips, and without trips we have no club. Thanks also to Dennis Brown for his coordination and organising work as Trips Booking Officer (and for the trips he designs and inspires). And thanks to Keith Ayton for organising the bus, and to all those who put their hand up to drive.

## Weekend Day Trips Report

This year saw 12 cancellations as a result of lockdowns (last year 25 cancellations), with no day trips between August 22nd and the end of November. When we were able to run trips they have been well attended by new and existing members alike. We continue to work around Waitakere and Hunua track closures with a varied

programme involving other destinations, as well as trying to schedule in two day walk weekends when we can.

Regular favourites have included Wires Track, Waiotahi, Broken Hills, Hakarimata, Ernies Track, Te Puru, Wairere Falls, and Maratoto / Golden Cross.

Te Araroa section walks are a great drawcard – this year we walked the Dome Forest, Auckland Coast to Coast and Devonport to Long Bay.

Out in the Hauraki Gulf we enjoyed Rangitoto and Waiheke Islands.

Exciting new (day walk) locations we visited were Te Rau Puriri regional park, Daly's Clearing Hut, Mahurangi West and Te Muri regional parks, Tanekaha (Brynderwyns) – twice, and Champion Hut.

New variations on old themes we explored included the re-opened tracks from Karamatura to Whatipu, Musick Point area, Mangere area, Waiorongomai valley and tops, North Shore parks, and recently reopened Waharau regional park combined with Tapapakanga regional park.

Two day weekends (Saturday and Sunday day walks with overnight holiday park accommodation) took us to the Southern Kaimai, mid Waikato (Karamu, Kakepuke, Maungatautari), with the February Rotoroa Island weekend also serving as a general weekend trip.

With so many Waitakere and Hunua regional parks' longer tracks remaining closed and / or becoming unpleasant because of uncomfortable walking surfaces, we are continuing to expand our day walk selection into other regional parks that until now have received lesser interest from us. There is a lot to offer out there, with some of the additions this year likely to become annual visits in the future.

Thanks to our leaders and drivers for continuing to make these walks a rewarding component of the ATC offering, including as an important way to attract new trampers to our club.

## **Transport Report**

Two years on and Covid -19 is still having a dramatic effect on our club bus trips with only 10,644km travelled. Our lowest ever. The year started well with all trips running until mid-August when the Delta variant arrived and the country was locked down and the Auckland borders closed, not to be opened until mid-December. In all, twelve bus day trips and four weekend trips were cancelled, then the Omicron variant and its isolation requirements forced the late cancellation of the November week away and the South Island Interim and Safari trips in February and March.

With the low kilometres run there was no scheduled service required in this financial year but there were still expenses and the start of maintenance costs with a CoF picking up front suspension sway bar wear and subsequent front tyre cupping developing. CAL Isuzu replaced the sway bar bushes and Auckland Truck Alignment advised both front tyres would need to be replaced due to uneven wear if only the damaged one was replaced. This all cost nearly \$1700.

During the year eight drivers volunteered for all the planned bus trips even when it was likely Covid would cancel some, as the situation changed and decisions were made week by week. In the end most of the day trips were rescheduled and finally went ahead usually with the original driver.

The club bus is ideal for through trips, but they do rely on drivers being willing to sacrifice full participation on these trips to drop off and pick up at a different location. Thanks to all the drivers who got us to our destinations and back and especially to those who always promptly reply to my requests for drivers. Thanks also to Linda Webber for years of organising the Wednesday trips and arranging drivers for these.

Working Bees were held on May 1st & again on March 26th to assist with the construction of the new deck. This has now been completed thanks to Jim & Brian and a small group of helpers. Staining of the deck has been delayed due to current high weekend occupancy levels.

The driveway gate is presently secured by a combination lock after the keyed padlock was cut.

Hut occupancy levels are down due to Covid from 141 to 96 this year.

## **Conservation Report**

ATC Members continue year on year to volunteer their time and personal expenses for a number of important conservation projects.

In the Tunawaea Stream area near Rangitoto Station in the NW Pureora forest there is a major pest control operation occurring every year to ensure that a significant kokako population is able to breed successfully. This last year's planned aerial pest control operation was cancelled by DOC at the last minute because of the August lockdowns, so the only work we were able to do during the year was maintenance on some tracks, planning for the installation of a DOC-directed (possum) baffle installation on our bait stations, and further planning for additional bait lines. So very much a holding pattern, not knowing what is happening out there with the bird population.

A new venture this year involving 5 ATC members and one Kaimai regular worker was a week long track maintenance job for the Backcountry Trust in the Waitotara Forest, clearing from Tahupo Hut to Puteore Hut and then on to the big clearing NW from Puteore. A novel, but essential, feature for the week were the helicopter rides to and from our work areas – just a few minutes flying and there we were - able to get started without a day or two walking in beforehand!

Club members continue to be actively involved with Kaimai track maintenance and the Hunua pest control programme.

In case you ask why track maintenance fits under the "conservation" heading, the definition of conservation in the Conservation Act is "the preservation and protection of natural and historic resources for the purpose of maintaining their intrinsic values, providing for their appreciation and recreational enjoyment by the public, and

safeguarding the options of future generations". Something that some parties, including DOC, sometimes try to conveniently forget about.

#### **ATC Online**

Our website goes from strength to strength, with a regular refresh and expansion of articles and trip reports – thanks to all the trip reporters who provide a great variety of reporting on our many wonderful trips. And what an amazing collection of photos these are providing too!

We now have an online booking form for NTK on our website, with this getting regular use, with the expectation that in a more "regular" year, we have increased usage at the hut.

We now have also two new reports, produced via especially written software, to simplify the task of compiling multiday trip lists, reducing significantly the work by the Booking Officer. These also provide trip organisers and leaders with immediate information on registrations for their trip.

This has been accompanied online by setting up each party for a multiday trip as a separate trip, allowing the existing website software to manage the number attending and number on any waiting list per party automatically.

In development as an extension to our main website, there is an ATC History website that in the coming year will be made available for everyone to access.

Our Facebook site is receiving regular posts following club trips. It now has over 3,200 members, and a wide participation in discussions arising on tramping related topics. Thanks to Chris Pooley, Teresa Janssen and Martin Woodhead for helping with our Facebook administration.

Our monthly email newsletters continually receive a 65% plus opening rate – which is high for an email circulation.

## ATC's 100th Anniversary

The Club turns 100 in October 2025 and last year the Committee started considering how to produce a Centenary publication to mark the milestone, in line with previous booklets marking our 21st, 40th, 50th, 60th and 75th anniversaries.

This led to a project to identify, collate and preserve many of our old Club records and materials – which were spread around several members' homes, the Club garage and in various places like the museum and library.

It was then decided we would digitise and make publicly available all Wanderlusts, early newsletters and Annual Reports we could locate, plus as many historic photos of interest we could lay our hands on.

This project is well underway. We are delighted to report we have located and digitised an almost complete set of Wanderlusts and Annual Reports plus several hundred fascinating photos spanning the decades.

We have also created a new website to present these materials which we hope will go live in May or June, with many more photos continuing to be added throughout the year.

This has been a large and ambitious project for the Club involving several hundred volunteer hours so far. Special thanks go to Jim Morrow for leading the photo collation and digitisation, Dennis Brown for researching and arranging the digitisation of the written materials and work on the new website, and Pete Waworis for steering us in the right direction and designing the new website structure. The cost of digitising the written materials has been met from the very generous Roger Taylor bequest. With our materials now readily available, Committee will now turn its attention to the far from small task of producing a worthy Centenary booklet.

The Club made an overall deficit of \$13,540 for the financial year, the deficit on operating activities before "Other Items" however improved 8% on last year -

- Subscription income was higher than last year by 9% due to a net gain in membership.
- Total Bus trip fee income was down 2% compared to last year. The Club Bus travelled fewer overall kilometres than last year due to Covid restrictions. Offset by trip fees increasing from 1 September 2021.
- NTK hut expenses this year benefited from a lower depreciation charge and a credit balance on repairs and maintenance due to a cost recovery reflecting the time spent to make the required repairs.
- Sundry activities this year includes subsidised outdoor first aid training for ATC members.
- Interest income is lower than last year. The weighted average interest rate being earned at 31 March 2022 is 1.53% down from 1.87% at 31 March 2021.
- A \$2000 bequest was received by the Club in memory of Barbara Carden.
- A digitisation/archiving project was undertaken to convert past Wanderlust publications and annual reports to electronic format that is available and searchable on the ATC history website along with historic photos. The costs (\$8,271) of this project have been funded by a transfer from the Roger Taylor bequest reserve.
- Capital expenditure this year on fixed assets was \$8,004 on a replacement deck for the NTK hut – this has been funded by a transfer from the Roger Taylor bequest reserve.

## **Honorary Life Member Nominations**

As an indication of our enduring appreciation, we appoint members who have provided great assistance to the ATC, usually over a long period, to the status of Honorary Life Member.

This year the committee has accepted nominations for Tony Walton and Hazel Walton.

Although not members for decades, their contribution as a team to the club and wider tramping movement is huge and ongoing. Tony quietly joined in June 2009. Soon his project management & computing skills were recognised and he was encouraged to take on the Treasurer role from 2011 to 2013. This was followed by election to President from July 2013, a role he still has.

Tony, supported by Hazel, has an exceptional capacity for working on every aspect of the club's activities, bar driving, although he was involved in the purchase of the new bus. He delights in the organising of trips, researching and compiling detailed notes for trip participants; leading many multiday and shorter local trips and assisting with maintenance of our website. For the past few years he has been the Sunday trips organiser.

In 2014 Tony was instrumental in setting up the Kaimai Ridgeway project under the ATC banner to maintain tracks and reopen long-abandoned tracks, improve and add huts and encourage other clubs to take on sections of track and hut improvements. Eighteen months later this became the Kaimai Ridgeway Trust. The whole project involves many meetings and negotiations with DoC Tauranga, NZ Deerstalkers Association and later iwi with hut negotiations leading in 2019 to the opening of a new Kaimai hut - Te Whare Okioki. For that project Tony managed the funding and finances ensuring that construction could continue without avoidable delay. Tony continues to do the paperwork and accounting for the Trust alongside organising and taking part in very regular track work weekends.

This Kaimai work was recognised by the FMC President and Tony was encouraged to become the northern region representative on the FMC Executive, a role he has done since 2020, involving talking to other clubs and compiling submissions.

When Kauri Dieback first became an issue Tony researched and questioned the quality of the available evidence and council's decisions, challenging these in submissions.

He has made excellent submissions on the Regional Parks Management Plans on behalf of ATC and FMC, also the Te Rau Puriri Concept Plan, Freedom Camping legislation and Incorporated Societies rule changes.

Under Tony's watch Memorial Hut was successfully transferred to a group of central North Island schools after multiple meetings.

The ATC kokako project has benefited from Tony's involvement from its very early days, with both hands-on work and data analysis. Hazel has compiled detailed road bait station guides and assisted with track surveying through to the adjacent Okahukura kokako area.

Hazel joined the club in 2015, after initially thinking to be a member you needed to be as fit as Tony. Her driving has always enabled Tony to attend the many North Island meetings for the Kaimai project, the Memorial Hut handover and FMC activities. They often check access and the destination road ends for upcoming trips and whether the bus can get there. Hazel continues to monitor Tony's club correspondence at first while Tony was still working, and nowadays while he is away on his frequent tramping trips.

For extended club trips Hazel provides researched weather reports for all groups using the InReach devices now that we don't use the mountain radio service. The Waltons have provided their home for many years for the regular general committee meetings, plus tours meetings, navigation and leadership courses and any other meeting needed, always with refreshments provided by Hazel.

Tony and Hazel's commitment to the club and capacity for advocating for diverse tramping interests is a full time role we have come to greatly appreciate over these past years.

### **Statement of Accounting Policies**

#### 1. Reporting entity

The Club is an Incorporated Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

The Club is also registered as a charitable entity under the Charities Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the institute of Chartered Accountants of New Zealand Financial Reporting Standards.

#### 2. Basis of Preparation

The Club has elected to apply the Tier 3 PBE Accounting Standard for a not-for-profit entity Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit). On the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000.

All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting.

The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

#### 3. Specific accounting policies

The following specific accounting policies that materially affect the measurement of financial performance and the financial position have been applied:

#### (a) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST.

#### (b) **Income tax**

The Club is registered as a charitable entity and is an "amateur game or sport promoter" in terms of the Income Tax Act. As such there is no liability for income tax.

#### (c) Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank Accounts and Cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and at-call balances.

#### (d) Investments

Investments have been stated at cost. If the market value falls below cost an impairment charge is recognised.

#### (e) Fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

#### (f) Depreciation

Depreciation is applied at the following rates:

#### 4. Contingent liability

On 1 September 2018 the assets and operations of the Memorial Hut at Iwikau village Mt Ruapehu were transferred to the Central Plateau Schools Alpine Charitable Trust ("CPSACT") by the Club.

The Hut is operated under a licence from the Department of Conservation (DOC), that licence was assigned by the Club to CPSACT with the consent of DOC. An assignment document was signed by the Club (the assignor), CPSACT (the assignee) and DOC (the grantor).

The assignment document includes provisions that the CPSACT assumes all the Club responsibilities under the DOC licence.

Also, as a term of this assignment document the Club covenanted with DOC that it remains liable to observe and perform the terms and conditions of the concession throughout the term of the licence. The licence expiry is on 30 June 2033.

The CPSACT was formed with the support of five central North Island schools. The Club has no reason to expect the CPSACT would cease management of Memorial Hut over this period.
